## Goals

The goals of Books to Bridge the Region are to promote literacy, to create conversations among communities, and to foster critical thinking related to a topic.

## Rationale

**Books to Bridge the Region** uses a themed approach with selections at several reading levels so that families can read together and readers of all ages can enjoy the conversations generated by these books. The books chosen for this year’s theme, “Journeys and Quests,” portray three very different types of quests. *Shadow Divers* describes an aquatic quest for historical answers that becomes a diving obsession for two friends. *The Lightning Thief* sends a 12-year old boy on a classic quest to recover a stolen thunderbolt — if he can survive the plots and attacks of mythological monsters. *The Journey of Oliver K. Woodman* maps the cross-country travels of a wooden man that will re-connect family members from opposite coasts, providing geographical highlights of places in the United States. The books were selected for their subject matter, writing quality, and reading pleasure. We hope that participants will enjoy the books and find much to discuss with members of their families and communities.



## About the Illustrator: Joe Cepeda

A commercial artist whose work has appeared in numerous magazines and publications, Joe Cepeda has also established himself as a respected picture-book illustrator since 1995. Cepeda received his B.F.A. in Illustration from California State University, Long Beach in 1992 and also studied Engineering at Cornell University. He is the illustrator of award-winning picture books such as *What a Truly Cool World* and *Nappy Hair*. Mr. Cepeda received the Recognition of Merit Award for 2000 from the George G. Stone Center for Children’s Books. In 2002, Cepeda received a Pura Belpré Honor Award, an honor that recognizes Cepeda’s work as it “portrays, affirms, and celebrates the Latino cultural experience in an outstanding work of literature for children and youth.” He currently lives in Southern California with his wife and son. ## Activity Ideas

- Create a new journey for Oliver. Use a map to show where he goes.
- Write a letter or postcard that Oliver might send.
- Design your own stamp, postcard, or stationery.
- Make your own travel journal, keeping track of your favorite things about a trip, like the food, scenery, activities, and weather.

## Discussion Questions

- If Oliver came to visit you, what kinds of things would you do together?
- What are some problems that Oliver and the people who help him might face in trying to get him from one place to another?
- Why do you think Oliver was such a good traveling companion?
- If you were Oliver, what places would you visit in the United States? Why? What would be pictured on the postcard you sent from each of those places?
- What do we learn from the journey that Oliver takes?

# Shadow Divers

In the fall of 1991 in the frigid Atlantic waters sixty miles off the coast of New Jersey, weekend scuba divers, John Chatterton and Richie Kohler, made a startling discovery: a sunken World War II German U-boat that, according to all the official records, simply shouldn't have been at that location. Over the next six years, an elite team of divers embarked on a quest to solve the mystery. Some would not live to see its end. Chatterton and Kohler, at first bitter rivals, were drawn into a deep bond of friendship. As the men's marriages frayed under the pressure of a shared obsession, their dives grew more daring, and each realized that he was hunting for more than the identities of a lost U-boat and its nameless crew.

For six years, she was the Children's Book Reviewer for the *Arkansas Democrat-Gazette*. In 1999, Darcy created the Novel Revision Retreat, which she teaches nationwide. She currently teaches creative writing at the University of Central Arkansas. She is a member of the Author's Guild and the 2007 recipient of the Arkansas Governor's Art Award for Individual Artist. The journey begins when a young girl invites her Uncle Ray, who lives in South Carolina, to visit her in California. Unable to get away, Uncle Ray builds a life-sized wooden man named Oliver to send to California instead of him. He puts Oliver beside the road with a note asking travelers who pick him up to send postcards to Ray along the route. In this way, he is able to track Oliver's adventures as postcards arrive from Arkansas, New Mexico, Utah and other places along Oliver's journey to California.

## About the Author: Robert Kurson

Robert Kurson grew up in the Chicago suburbs. He earned a bachelor's degree in philosophy from the University of Wisconsin, then a law degree from Harvard Law School. He practiced real estate law, but quit to pursue a writing career. To make ends meet, he worked full time as a drapery and window blinds installer, then as a Wal-Mart options trader at the Chicago Board Options Exchange. He was hired by the Chicago *Sun-Times* as a data entry clerk, a position which led to a full-time features writing job. In 2000, *Esquire* published "My Favorite Teacher," Kurson's first magazine story, which became a finalist for a National Magazine Award. He moved from the *Sun-Times* to *Chicago* magazine, then to *Esquire*, where he is a contributing editor. His stories have appeared in *Rolling Stone*, *The New York Times Magazine*, and other publications. He lives in the Chicago suburbs. Kurson's latest book is *Crashing Through*. ## Discussion Questions

- Would you define deep wreck diving as an adventure, a quest, or a fatal obsession?
- In what ways do Chatterton's and Kohler's backgrounds and earlier lives prepare them for their quest to identify the U-Who? What attributes enable them to persevere?
- How do Chatterton and Kohler solve the dilemma of searching for historical artifacts without disturbing the dead?
- The divers discovered to their dismay that historical facts provided to them during their search were not always correct. How has your view of history changed by reading this story?
- Divers continue to debate the ethics of removing artifacts from shipwrecks. When is it proper to take artifacts from wrecks? Does your answer change if there are human remains onboard?
- One of the divers gave up diving for two years in an effort to keep his family together. Must a person surrender his true passion in order to live a happy and fulfilled life?

## Discussion Questions

- What is a *hero*? Does that definition change at different stages in the book? The hero's journey or quest is a common element in literature, including trials/adventures, supernatural elements or monsters, guides, certain companions, tool or weapons, etc. Plot Percy's journey as a hero. What is the purpose of his journey? What does he learn or bring back?
- Percy's learning disabilities become strengths in a different context. What seem to be attention problems allow him to be aware of all sides of attack during a battle. While he struggles to read English, he masters Greek easily. Do you have characteristics that might seem like weaknesses in one setting, but become strengths in another?
- What strength does each of the three companions bring to the quest? How have your friends helped you complete something that was important to you?

## Activity Ideas

- Talk about the ways in which myths were used to explain everyday situations (sunrise, seasons, storms, etc.).
- Prepare an artistic representation of a god/goddess or a poster listing the attributes of various gods. Which trait/power would you most like to have?
- Discuss some examples of real life quests. Have you ever searched for a lost pet (a quest to find someone or something)? Are there questions you've researched for hours because you just had to know the answer (a quest for knowledge)? Have you worked very hard to earn money to buy something you want (a quest for reward)?

# The Lightning Thief

By Rick Riordan



What if the gods of Olympus were alive in the 21st Century? What if they still fell in love with mortals and had children who might become great heroes – like Theseus, Jason and Hercules? What if you were one of those children? Such is the discovery that launches 12-year-old Percy Jackson on the most dangerous quest of his life. With the help of a satyr and a daughter of Athena, Percy must journey across the United States to catch a thief who has stolen the original weapon of mass destruction – Zeus’ master bolt. Along the way, he must face a host of mythological enemies determined to stop him. Most of all, he must come to terms with a father he has never known, and an Oracle that has warned him of betrayal by a friend.

## About the Author: Rick Riordan

For fifteen years, Riordan taught English and history at public and private middle schools in the San Francisco Bay Area and in Texas. In 2002, Saint Mary’s Hall honored him with the school’s first Master Teacher Award. The Percy Jackson novels draw on Riordan’s experience teaching Greek mythology and his interaction with students who have learning differences. Film rights for *The Lightning Thief* have been purchased by Twentieth Century Fox, and a feature film is in development. Rick Riordan now writes full-time, but he still harbors hopes that someday he will return to the classroom. There are currently four books in the Percy Jackson series: *The Lightning Thief*, *The Sea of Monsters*, *The Titan’s Curse*, and *The Battle of the Labyrinth*. Riordan’s most recent novel is *The Maze of Bones*, the first book in The 39 Clues series. When asked how to pronounce his last name, Riordan tells people that the first syllable rhymes with “fire.” He lives in San Antonio with his wife and two sons.
